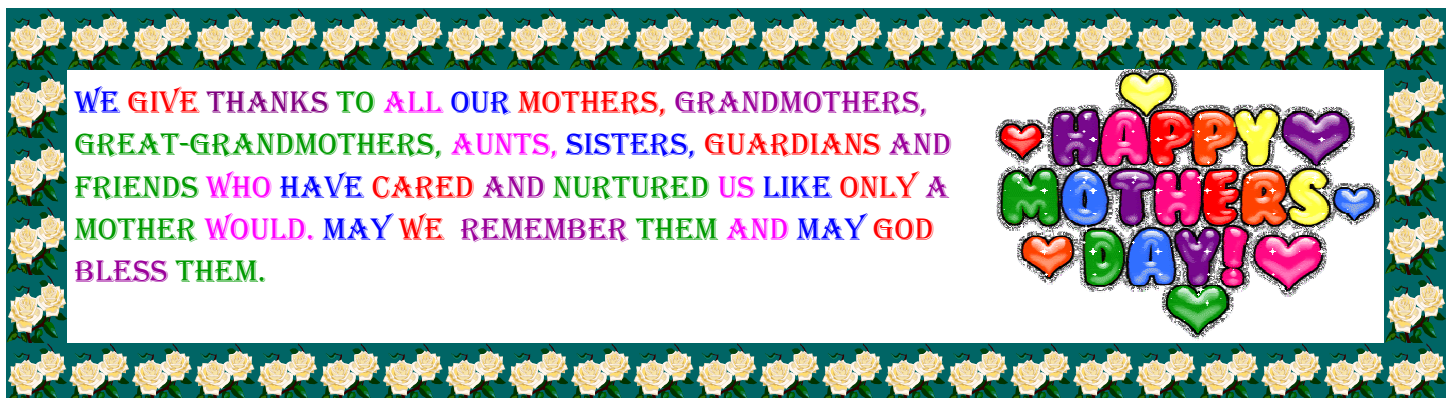

Julie brought the meeting to order at 6:21 pm.

Lou filled in for J.R. with the pledge and prayer because he was not able to attend this meeting. Julie said an anonymous donor is giving \$40.00 gift cards for the BBQ Dine n Dash. Another anonymous donor is giving money to the ECPAAA for Food during meetings and would like Eric Brunstad to head up the Food Committee. Susanna talked to Eric to see if he would be willing to do so and he said yes. Julie will propose the plan during the General Meeting for a vote. Susanna updated and continues to work on the ECPAAA volunteer sign-up sheets. She will get more people to sign-up during the General Meeting. What are the guidelines of the Bereavement Committee? Julie and Leah discussed and Julie will get with Betty to fill her in. Next event is Police Appreciation Week proposed for May 15th. Julie will firm up the date and let everyone know. There is no word about the Honor Guard and vehicle help. Julie wants us to ask members at the General Meeting for deserts and drinks for the Presidential Award Presentation on Monday, April 24th. Julie will pass around sign-up sheets for anyone interested in buying Hofer T-shirts. It will take 1 month to get them. Susanna mentioned a typo on the Treasurer’s report of 1 cent for savings interest. She will bring it up at the General Meeting. Julie asked what the status was for Arbor Daze. We need more volunteers to man the table, which will be next to the Police Department trailer and display. Julie will ask people to sign-up on the volunteer sheets. Leah reported that we made \$476.53 for CRUD. Dana said that there are still a lot of people that have not paid dues. She will mention it again at the General Meeting.

CPAANT Liaison — Leah Benoit - May 2017



The meeting was held at the Roanoke Community Center on May 6th and there were approximately 40 people in attendance representing 15 cities. The speaker was Paul Lake, Founder and Executive Director of Search One Rescue Team. Paul actually spoke to the Euless CPAAA a few years ago. He started off asking what is the average walking speed of an adult to figure out how far a missing person can travel. The answer is 2 miles per hour with a travel distance of a 4 mile radius. Based on the direction a person can travel, which is 360 degrees – North, South, East, West and all the possibilities in-between, and using the formula of $\text{Area} = 3.14 \times \text{Radius}^2$, within 1 hour a 12.58 square mile area would be the area that would have to be searched for the person, 2 hours 50.24 square miles. This was an example of what they face when they are called out to help with a search.

The Search One Rescue Team have been in operation for 34 years and consists of 30 active members and 17 dogs, with a mixture of German Shepherds, Labradors, Golden Retrievers and Blood Hounds. They have served 150 agencies, based out of DFW Airport and 91% of their calls (average 6 per month) are within the 150 mile radius they cover around the DFW Airport. They train every Sunday for 4 hours and attend a monthly meeting. To date, they have lost 22 dogs and 1 team member. To become a team member, there is a thorough application and screening process which includes a background check. There is 6 months basic training, which at that time you earn a flanker certification. To become a K9 handler, there is an additional 18 months of training and certification. There is also an annual physical assessment, which is a 5 mile cross country walk wearing 25 pounds of gear in your search boots.

The main types of searches and percent of calls related the team performs are rural (18%), wilderness (3%), urban (42%), human remains detection (8%), light disasters (2%) and the other 27% are various other types of calls. The summer months are their busiest. A few basic K9 facts: dogs can detect 10,000 different odors; detect airborne rafts or skin cells sloughing off a person; they use scent patterns the way humans use visual images; and they can detect a single molecule of scent and can discriminate between minute amounts of scents. When trailing a person, a blood hound is usually used. They work on a lead and use a scent article from the missing person and pretty much have their nose to the ground while trailing. For air scent searches, the dog works off a lead and can detect any scent not in his pack, which consists of the handler, the dog and the flanker. The dog will bark or perform a re-find to indicate the find. For human remains detection both buried in land or submerged in water, the dogs are trained in all ranges of decomposition. The dogs work for a reward and are not affected by death. For light disaster searches, the dog works off lead and will bark when they find something. They are adapted to work in high stress, high risk environments.

At the end of the presentation, Paul brought in his dog Blade, a female black German Shepherd. Their funds come from \$10 a month dues from the team members and public contributions. Julie brought the meeting to order at 7:04 pm

J.R. was at a funeral so Lou did the pledge, prayer and allegiance. Julie opened by wishing everyone a happy tax day. Last month's meeting minutes were approved by a motion from Faye and was seconded by Betty Overstreet. Corrections on the Treasurer's report were approved with a motion from Paul Haberer and seconded by Diana Deering.

April Meeting Speaker - Sr. Corporal Rocky Fimbres — Refresher on CHL/LTC Do's and Don'ts.

In 2015 open carry was passed in the State of Texas but not a lot of people do it. Rocky prefers to be concealed himself. There are 2 types in Texas. Constitutional open carry = long guns and Legislative carry = hand guns. Open carry must be in a waist or shoulder holster to be legal. It is legal to have a gun in a vehicle. It should be away from arms length. What should citizens do if they see someone carrying openly? Do nothing unless the person is causing a disturbance. Can a Police Officer arrest and disarm a person who is legally carrying a long gun in public. No, there must be probable cause to act under the Peace Officer Authority, for example, if there is a safety issue, if it is being used in a threaten manner or the person is displaying unstable behavior. First, do not confront the person and second seek safety. A person cannot carry a licensed gun into an establishment whose service is 51% alcohol, in a court, schools, polling places, racetracks, airports and anywhere there is a 30.6 CHL sign, or a 30.7 LTC sign. Anyone can get a sign for their business. It must be written verbatim and in English and Spanish. To get and LTC license you only have to attend a 4 hour class and qualify 1 time. Know your weapon. It is best to practice 1-2 times a month. CHL/LTC acceptance varies from State to State so do some research before you travel. Rocky recommends that if you have guns in your home buy a safe to keep them in, because ultimately you are responsible for anything that happens with a gun in your home.

Lou update everyone on the Brick Fundraiser. So far we have raised \$750 in brick sales. Lou encouraged everyone to feel free to buy one. He also reminded the members about the Presidential Award Presentation. It will be casual dress. Sharon Wilson, of the Tarrant County Criminal District Attorney's office will be the speaker. He encouraged everyone to come out and support this event. There will be a special award given out, but you must come to find out what it's going to be. Please bring snacks and drinks. Leah reported that CRUD brought in \$476.53 for ECPAAA. Julie told the members that a sign-up sheet was available to order a Hofer shirt. The cost is \$13.00 and to make checks payable to ECPAAA. Susanna updated the members on the Volunteer Sign-up Sheets and pass out the updated ones. She encouraged everyone to sign-up for a committee, task or job. There are lots of openings that need volunteers. Julie mentioned that Police Appreciation Week was coming up in May and if anyone had ideas to let her know asap because it is coming up quickly.
